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

Has no one ever told you that you've been making these same mistakes in Spanish over and over again? Take a minute to discover what've you been saying wrong and stop it once and for all!

Don't say "Me recuerdo" Say "Me acuerdo"

Don't say "un otro" Sav "otro"

Don't say "una idioma" Say "un idioma"

Don't say "Me duele mi cabeza" Say "Me duele la cabeza"

Don't say "es bien" Say "está bien"



You shouldn't say "ok" You should say "vale"

Don't say "La gente son" Say **"La gente es"** 

Don't say "Soy un profesor" Say "Soy profesor

# Impress your workmates with these Spanish phrases

Want to make your workmates believe that instead of sunbathing in Benidorm all summer, you've actually been working hard on your Spanish? Try using one of AlL Madrid's work-related expressions on your first day back at the office and leave them speechless.

# Trabajar de sol a sol

Also known as: from dawn till dusk. What's tragic is that this expression is used by the Spanish to say that they are spending their entire day inside the office walls. You would use it like this: "Voy a trabajar de sol a sol para cumplir con los plazos de este proyecto"; "I'm going to work all day on this project to hand it in on time".

## Trabajar codo con codo

In a team, "de colegueo" or "haciendo piña". Us Spanish say that we work codo con codo (side by side, literally "elbow to elbow") when we work together with one or more workmate. The expression also suggests that you get on well with your teammates, because if you finish the day wanting to kill them, it wouldn't be considered a "codo con codo" job. A common use of this expression would "Si trabajamos codo con codo duplicaremos nuestras ventas en menos

de un año"; "If we work side by side we will double our sales in less than a year".

# Trabajar a destajo

To work a lot, non-stop whilst in the zone. If someone says that they work 'a destajo', they mean that they work a lot, and without rest. Use it to earn points with your boss saying "No me importa trabajar a destajo si la empresa lo necesita"; "I don't mind working non-stop if the company needs it".

## Sudar tinta

When someone says they "suda tinta" (sweat ink) at work or studying, it means that they are working extremely hard. For example: "Si hay que sudar tinta para sacar el proyecto hoy, se suda"; "If we have to sweat ink in order to bring this project out today, we'll do it".

Tetley tells his story.


relocated in August last year from the UK, where I was Head of a school in Suffolk, and like any international move, it was not without challenges. The main issues were that I was relocating on my own (my eldest son was in the middle of his GCSE courses so my family stayed in the UK for another year) and I was on crutches having just got out of plaster after rupturing my Achilles tendon. So everything, even getting some shopping, was a challenge!

Having said that, despite these initial teething problems, Madrid was a remarkably easy city to move to. In fact, I can honestly say it was a joy. Having previously lived in Japan, where every day brought new faux pas and misunderstandings, the minor cultural differences in Spain (such as meetings always starting late and everyone talking over each other!) were really not an issue and I have found Spanish people delightful - really welcoming and generous. The city offers something for everyone: great food; world-class art museums; amazing football etc. Unlike other places I have lived, Madrid 'works' really well and, despite the occasional strike, transport is efficient and cheap and I have given up owning a car altogether so I can enjoy exploring on foot. And then there's the climate of course – for a British person, used to rain, cloudy skies, more rain... my first winter here was a revelation, with blue skies from January to March. In my humble opinion, I think Madrid offers as good a quality of life as one will find anywhere in the world. I couldn't be happier I made the move.

Now that my family has joined me, I hope to make far fewer Ryanair flights between Madrid and the UK. I am also hoping Real Madrid will have a slightly more successful season!

# Skilfully balancing cristóbal balenciega at the thyssen museum

"When my grandfather was working at a prestigious hotel in Paris he met Gary Grant. They struck up a close friendship and soon became very chummy. Just before the debonair actor left Paris he presented my grandad with a Balenciaga perfume for my grandmother. Today the bottle holds a pride of place on my dressing table." So explained Maria Angeles to me as we waited for the opening of the eagerly awaited Balenciaga exhibit at Museo Thyssen.

Days before the opening I had had the honour of being invited to private screening of the film Phantom Thread – inspired by the life and times of Cristóbal Balenciaga (1895-1972). Starring Daniel Day-Lewis, in his last role before retiring from acting , the film may appeal to a relatively few buffs as the movie is slow

and contains very few dialogues but nevertheless, was highly acclaimed by the critics and won an Oscar and a Bafta.

Cristóbal Balenciega hailed from Getaria, a coastal fishing town in the Basque Country, Northern Spain, where both his parents José Balenciega, a fisherman and Martina Elzacquirre, a seamstress struggled day in and day out to make a

living.

Balenciaga's passion to create can be traced to his childhood when he spent endless hours in his mother's room replete with bundles of colourful cloth. He observed her as she went through the painful process of measuring, creating patterns and finally sewing elaborate outfits for the aristocrats in town.

The highlight of every long summer was the arrival of the Marquis and Marchioness. Young Balenciaga pa-





The fresh odour of the fabrics from London and Paris lingered on for many a day stimulating his thoughts. imagination new no bounds. This was obvious in the umpteen pages of his notebooks packed with sketches of strikingly beautiful women garbed in stunning dresses.

Soon the marchioness became his customer and patron. She had a tremendous foresight and sent the talented lad to Madrid for training.

In 1917 he set up his own house in San Sebastian. Still in his early twenties Balenciega opened his fashion house both in Barcelona and Madrid.

Soon he was working with the royalty and eventually the world of Haute Couture took on a new dimension.

– chemise, high-waisted dresses, ski-jackets, outlandish coats, black taffeta, cocktail dresses, stunning black coats akin to kimonos emerged from the master's skilful hands. He also reshaped women's silhouettes adding beauty to the slim waist into the bargain.


Eventually he became famed for his exquisite craftsmanship and ground-breaking designs. Later on his creative talent extended to handbags and shoes.

When the civil war broke out Balenciega moved to Paris where his unusual creations caught on and celebs in the likes of Grace Kelly, Ava Gardner, Jacqueline Kennedy and Mona Von Bismarck became his regular clients.

He had the honour of creating an extraordinary wedding dress for Fabiola de Mora y Aragón when she married King Bedouin of Belgium. He reached the zenith of his creations in the 1950s and 1960s.

This is the first exhibit almost in fifty years dedicated to Balenciega in the capital. Curator Eloy Martínez de La Pera have skilfully assembled 90 of his designs combined with 56 paintings.

Balenciega died in 1972.

ince 1936, one of the most representative symbols on the Puerta del Sol was the gigantic illuminated advertising sign that until April 2001 was mounted on the roof of what in its day had been the most elegant and luxurious hotel in the city, the Hotel Paris.

The sign displayed the trademark of the well-known Jerez sherry (dry sack) Tío Pepe. Under the name of the wine you could read: "Sol de Andalucía embotellado" (Bottled Sun of Andalucía) and the name of its maker, González Byass. To the left was placed the company's cute logo: a bottle of Tío Pepe dressed up as an Andalusian gentleman, with his typical widebrimmed hat and short red waistcoat holding, most appropriately, a guitar in his hand. The figure was a legacy from the days when the square had been filled with advertising signs and commercial billboards. However, these were subsequently banned by the

municipal authorities, but an exception was made for the Tio Pepe sign, which was allowed to remain atop the building.

Despite the efforts of succeeding mayors to have the structure torn down, the removal of the sign was repeatedly thwarted since for the citizens of Madrid the advertisement was, as much as the clock atop Government House or the Mariblanca statue, an intrinsic and familiar part of the Puerta del Sol. Although there was no legal protection for the sign not to be withdrawn, it had unofficially become a sort of national monument and was considered to be, to an extent, sacrosanct.

When the old Hotel Paris closed in May 2006, and after standing empty for several years, the building's new owners started a complete overhaul of the property and in april 2011 dismantled the Tío Pepe sign.

Then, in April 2012, the new came that the building was being converted into an Apple megastore and that the sign would not be re-mounted in its original place. The news triggered an indignant response from Madrileños, and the controversy about the Tío Pepe sign was taken up by the media. To add to the hullabaloo, City Hall made it clear that, legally speaking, the new owner was in his right to not replace the sign and that nothing more could be done about it.

However, our story has a happy ending. For in May 2014 the Tío Pepe sign, now repainted and repaired, returned to the Puerta del Sol, this time, to grace the roof of a building opposite Government House, from where the "Bottled Sun of Andalucía" once again shines over the square.

ravelling to foreign countries can often be a great adventure – one that explores language, culture and food. But the traveller should take a special care in ensuring before he sets out that the health problems that he might encounter abroad are covered by an adequate insurance.







# **Harvest Festival**

It's that time of the year again. The little green and red orbs have gotten plump and fat, full of juice and sugar and are ready to be plucked, crushed, fermented and turned into that most wonderful of drinks: wine!

es, it's time for the cosecha, the harvest. And this means, in short, a new vintage with a new character. Was it a cool year or hot? Were there Spring hails that damaged the crop thus reducing the final amount of wine? Was it a wet or dry year? All these things have affected the grapes since winter ended and have been changing the course of life for our little fruit-balls.

The farmers have been monitoring the grapes and are now at the stage when they need to choose when to pick which ones. Am I going to hand pick or use machines...or donkeys? Have the grapes ripened enough to have attained the right levels of sugar that I need? How is the upcoming weather looking? Let me check the forecast and see how long I can leave my grapes on the vine before some rain comes and ruins everything.

The harvest and the timing thereof is as much a speculative lottery as it is ancient agricultural learning. Start off with the grapes for the sparkling wines, we want acidity and less of that pesky sugar. Then the white grapes, the reds and finally, if we are making it, the late harvest wine grapes. You



can monitor scientifically, using scales like the Brix scale that measures sugar levels. Or, like the veterans, eat the grape and see if it tastes right.

The picked grapes are then sorted on tables to remove any diseased or damaged fruit. After that the crusher-destemmers, mythical machines which, though I understand the function, I still don't really understand how they seem to work, remove the stems and seeds before the squished grapes go to the fermentation tanks to eventually start their journey to becoming wine.

The harvest is often a time of celebration in the wine world. Indeed, harvest festivals of many crops and many religions are a focal point of the year. In many wineries over the world

there are 'events' where members of the public or local villagers and families get into the vineyards to pick grapes or take part in a traditional foot stomp to get the process underway.

In Spain there are plenty of 'fiestas de la vendimia'; grape harvest festivals, mostly in September. There are usually street food stands grilling chorizo and pancetta, bunting, and a whole lot of local wine flowing freely into plastic cups, live music, processions, traditional dance and dress.

Some notable fiestas include: Fiesta del Vino in Olite (1-3 September), Fiesta de la Vendimia de Montilla (1-4 September), Fiesta de la Vendimia del Vino de Jerez (1-17 September), Las Fiestas de la Vendimia Riojana (20-25 September in Logroño). A lot of the wine towns, like Requena, Valdepeñas, Cariñena, Rueda will have fiestas. Where do you want to drink? Put into Google with the words 'fiesta de vino' or 'fiesta de la vendimia' and there will most likely be something.

There's also the Rias Baixas 'bus do viño' that takes you around various bodegas and eateries during harvest time; the Vendimia del Vino de Calidad in Cangas de Narcea in Asturias that takes place 12-15 October – yes there's wine in them hills; and, interestingly, the 3rd (only third somehow) Gran Fiesta de la Vendimia in Ribera del Duero (Aranda del Duero).

With a little planning and desire to ruin your liver just that little bit more it's easy enough to attend these fiestas. I would also suggest as a final thing following our local DO Vinos de Madrid on Facebook as some of our local pueblos like Alcala, Navalcarnero, San Martin, also host their own fiestas.



# SULTAN OF SWING

Kimberley Bailey talks to Rock 'n' Roll Hall of Fame inducteee and Dire Straits co-founder John Illsley about his forthcoming concert in Madrid at Joy Eslava on October 12th

# Perhaps a cliché question, but what inspired you to put a tour together now?

Its a long time [27 years] since Dire Straits played in Spain, so now seems a good time to revisit.

# How did you even begin choosing the incredible line-up for your band?

I have been playing with these musicians for about 5 years now, it works well together.

# How long has it been since you've been on tour like this?

We have been touring in Europe these last few years in Holland, Germany Switzerland and France, there are a lot of people who like to hear the Dire Straits music played by original members.

# How long have you been preparing for this? In terms of both the music and executing and organising the tour itself.

All tours take a lot of time to organise, we decide quite early what songs we will play, mostly Dire Straits music but also music from my 6 solo albums.

# What are you most excited about? And what are you most apprehensive about?

My memory of the Spanish audiences was very positive they loved the Dire Straits band and I am looking forward to bringing to life the Dire Straits sound for these concerts.

# How will compare to tours you did with Dire Straits?

The Dire Straits tours were very big obviously, I am now singing so this is also big difference, I understand the feel of the music so it will be good to listen too.

# What are some of your favourite tour memories?

So many to remember, but playing with some wonderful musicians over the years with Dire Straits, and playing in so many different countries it was an honour and a pleasure.

# How has the music industry changed since the days of the Dire Straits and now?

In essence nothing has changed, musicians still want to make music, write songs and perform, the way music is delivered is different, musicians have less control than they did before, it is more about business than the music and also a lot of the music sounds the same because radio demands this.

# How much do you keep in touch with members of the Dire Straits?

I keep in touch with Mark and Guy Fletcher often , less often with the other members

In your own words, what can fans expect? A very exciting concert of musical memories of Dire Straits plus some original songs played by very good musicians, who have worked with other great musicians.

# How would you sum-up this whole experience? And how has it differed from your previous tours?

Well things change over time and you have to adjust to suit the situation, I am still loving playing in front of people and the audiences seem to love what we do. Do you envisage doing another tour after this? I will continue to do small tours depending what comes up

# How's your pub, the East End Arms, going to cope without its landlord?

The pub is doing very well thank you but I don't stand behind the bar serving drinks, they will manage quite well without me!

# Have you been to Madrid before? What do you anticipate from the crowd?

I have visited Madrid many times over the years I love the food, the architecture and the Art Galleries I am sure that the people who come to the concert in Madrid will have a wonderful time, this is a great band!!

Hello all!! It's August and I'm writing from Mallorca, where I'm working as a #yachtchef for the summer, very exciting!!

have a beautiful market here, in Palma, Mercat d'Olivar, where I buy very special produce. As always, I recommend you do your fresh shopping in many of the markets of Madrid (Maravillas, Chamartín, Las Ventas, La Paz, among others) You will be really amazed by the variety and quality!! Now in summer, you will find great melon, watermelon, juicy peaches, fullflavour tomatos and exquisite FIGS.

The first months of the summer, you will see black figs (not really black though, more like purplish) which are the ones that were not ripe last autumn and bloom at the beginning of the season. They're very tasty, but for me not as good as green figs, marvelously sweet and rich. You can buy these at the end of August, beginning of September.

Figs make a happy marriage with fatty and savoury ingredients, so I always mix them in salads, with jamón ibérico, gorgonzola, cecina, mojama, one or the other...not all together, and with tenderness, they are very fragile...!

I bring you a very simple recipe, which will make you rock:

# FIGS & Burrata

INGREDIENTS FOR 4:

• 6 figs • 1 or 2 burratas • Rucola • Dried tomatos (not in oil) • Fresh tomatos (tomate rosa, raff or similar) • Olives (Kalamata style, black from Aragon...) • Pistacchios • Balsamic vinegar • Extra virgin olive oil Make a vinaigrette with chopped pistacchios, balsamic, coarse salt and oil, and voilá!!! Alternative to vinaigrette (or both so your guests can choose), dried tomato Pesto: • 10 dried tomates (not ones in oil, just dried)



• 100 grs of pinenuts • 50 grs of parmegiano regiano • 1/2 clove of garlic Salt and extra virgin olive oil...hand blender and you will definitely surprise all

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# Why Has the Spanish Economy Remained Strong This Year?

# The global economy has struggled in 2019

uartz reports that 70% of the world's economy is on a downturn, forcing the International Monetary Fund (IMF) to downgrade for the fourth time in nine months its global economic growth forecast. This is the most extensive synchronised slowdown since 2011, and it is being caused by US-China trade tensions, a weakening automotive sector in Germany, economic turmoil in Turkey and Argentina, and credit tightening in China, among other factors. But one country that is bucking this trend is Spain.

The Spanish economy has been strong this year continuing on from previous years. Bloomberg notes that Spain has been one of Europe's best-performing economies, consistently outgrowing other countries since the start of 2018. That momentum has carried over to 2019, with Spain's economy growing by 0.7% in the first quarter. It is expected to grow by 2.2% this year — twice the pace of other economies in the region. That is in spite of expected turbulence for the Spanish economy in 2019. Expectations were dampened, but growth has continued nonetheless.

The fact that Spain's economy is performing well is testament to its resilience. After being hit hard by the financial crisis of 2008, . Ironically, that same crisis may have set the country up for long-term viability. With the economy in tatters and consumer spending at a low, firms in Spain began looking overseas to sell their products. "With a shrinking domestic market, both in the private and public sector, small and medium-sized companies in particular risked going to the wall because of a shrinking domestic market," explained William Chislett, Associate Researcher at the Real Instituto Elcano. "The only alternative they had was to go abroad and see if they could sell there, which they did successfully on the whole." This eventually led to an export surge that has helped Spain recover from 2008. Now, this export-driven economy is outperforming its European neighbours.

This robust economy has also had a positive impact on employment. A South EU Summit report on Spain's economic upturn states that the Bank of Spain is predicting the country's unemployment rate to fall from

14.4% in 2018 to 12% by 2021. Reducing unemployment rates is helping boost salaries and increase purchasing power. This is on top of the increase in consumer spending, which is indicative of people's trust in the economy. The Economic Calendar on FXCM shows how the Spanish Consumer Price Index has been experiencing very little volatility. This is a sign that the economic situation in the country is stable, and will likely remain that way. A number of factors point to such scenario. Firstly, companies are shrinking profit margins, thereby allowing consumer spending to stay steady. Secondly, Spain's economy is getting a huge boost

from tourism. In fact, it is now second only to France in terms of receiving the most number of international tourists. Finally, investors have faith in Spain's resurgent economy. This is evident through the €108 billion worth of Spanish bonds that Mitsubishi UFJ Kokusai Asset Management recently bought.

With a contentious election now over, the challenge for the socialist PSOE is to continue this economic momentum. Many in the country are still worried about employment levels and how Brexit might affect the economy. The remaining months of the year will be crucial in demonstrating whether the country can continue at its current economic level, or whether the predictions of a turbulent year were in fact correct



# HEALTH & WELLBEING

If you have been in Spain for more than three months, then you need to register as a resident. You need to first make an appointment with foreigner's department in your local Police Station, which you can do online. Once you have an appointment, you need to take along your passport, a photocopy of it and your census certificate (padrón) from the local town hall. You will also need two passport size photos, the EX18 form and have paid the fee of €10.60.

Under new residency laws you may need to show you have an income of over €800 a month to support yourself. If you do not have an income you may have to fill out form 790 which allows the state to check you have sufficient funds in your bank account to support yourself.

If you are working and have a job, you will pay national insurance contributions and have access to the public healthcare system. The same applies if you are a British pensioner, for the moment you can use your S1 card to access the public health system.

If on the other hand you are not working or are a student and under retirement age, then you will also need to show proof of a year's private health insurance with an authorised Spanish-registered underwriter, showing that you will not be a burden to the welfare state in Spain.

There are very specific requirements for the type of health insurance and the cover

that it includes. Not all health insurance policies meet these requirements and people have been refused residency for not having sufficient cover.

What are the minimum requirements medical insurance has to meet for residency purposes?

# 1. Integral Health Care Cover

The insurance must offer Complete Healthcare cover. This means that the insurance must cover the same benefits as social security in Spain.

Below is a summary of the services that health insurance for residency must include:

- Primary care
- Emergency Services
- Medical and surgical specialties
- Preventive medicine
- Diagnostic means
- Therapeutic treatments
- Hospitalization

• Medical expenses covering more than €100,000

# 2. No Copayments

In this type of insurance only the payment of the premium (or fee) is made, without the need for additional payments. The insured person can be seen by the insurer's medical staff as many times as they need without the need to make additional payments.

It is important to highlight the periodicity of the insurance premium, since it is often advisable that the contract and the premium be annual, in this way we ensure that our application will be approved.

# 3. Limit of medical expenses

The limits put on medical expenses by most insurers are usually  $\in$  30,000 or  $\in$  50,000 or  $\in$  100,000. In the case of foreign students in Spain, the authorities usually require that medical insurance has a minimum limit of  $\in$  100,000 in medical expenses.

But to be fully covered for any eventuality, we would recommend a policy without limit.


Unlike Facebook, LinkedIn or other Social Networks - you cannot really add hyperlinks to posts; making for a different user experience.

# AFTER THE FALL

obias Buck arrived in Madrid in December 2012, in time to celebrate the bleakest Christmas the city had seen in a generation. Capital and country were reeling from a series of economic shocks that had brought Spain to the brink of ruin. The housing boom had dramatically turned to bust, a large chunk of the nation's banking system was in state hands, businesses were closing across the country, debt was spiralling out of control and unemployment levels had reached a record high.

AFTER THE FALL presents a rich and vivid portrait of contemporary Spain at a critical moment in the country's history. The book tells the story of Spain's long boom and

sudden bust, the brutal economic crisis that followed, and the political and social after-shocks that reverberate to this day. It explores the origins of the separatist movement in Catalonia, and its bitter clash with the Spanish government that culminated in a failed secession referendum and a divisive declaration of independence. It looks at the legacy of the Civil War and Franco dictatorship, and the continuing struggle over historical memory in Spain today.

Based on five years of reporting and hundreds of interviews, AFTER THE FALL takes the reader from the offices of power in Madrid and Barcelona to the villages of the Basque country, still haunted by the memory of political violence, and to the towns of Andalusia, where an entire generation has seen its economic hopes shattered. It describes how the country has been changed by the experience of migration, and why - after decades at the margins - the far-right eventually made a return to Spanish politics. For all the problems and challenges facing Spain today the book is optimistic in tone and thought for its future.

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


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
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







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
